THE REFLECTION

I was away for a week and we looked at the best book on the Catholic faith. It is called Youcat and is accessible as a book or on the internet as a PDF file. It covers all the Catholic faith and is authentic, the Vatican approved teaching. Youcat gives some quotations from all time to illustrate the idea. The full Catechism is a heavy book, over 700 big pages of type with footnotes of the tradition and bible references. It fully explains some of the questions that we can be unsure about, some about administration and persons, such as for marriage or baptism gives the idea of what's allowed are to do with Canon Law which explains how the institution of the Church works. Canon law is about administration, the Catechism is about what we believe and what we should do.

One important development in this, is about Sin. There are venial and Mortal sins – separating us from Christ, but there are no actions listed as sins in themselves. No people or faith is condemned to Hell, only by self-exclusion, never coming to a change of heart and always refusing God's love. People who have same sex attraction should be accepted without reservation, although their sexual actions can never result in the birth of children as our bodies are so designed by God.

The most surprising is the 7th commandment, "You must not steal" is a platform for our attitude to property. There is a development of social justice teaching and our mutual obligations. Our rich man should be aware that he should pay his workers the right wages, working in humane conditions, and not profiteer by dynamic pricing.

We should all be aware of the environment and our shared responsibility; productivity should serve human nature and managing earths goods.

Personal property should still be respected and has a social obligation; Bill Gates seem to have got it right. Pope Benedict put this clearly when he wrote that Justice precedes charity, the goods of creation are destined for the whole human race. Not to enable the poor to share in our good is to steal from them.
